A: Research: You will be given (drawn from a hat) a Greek mythological hero, god or goddess.

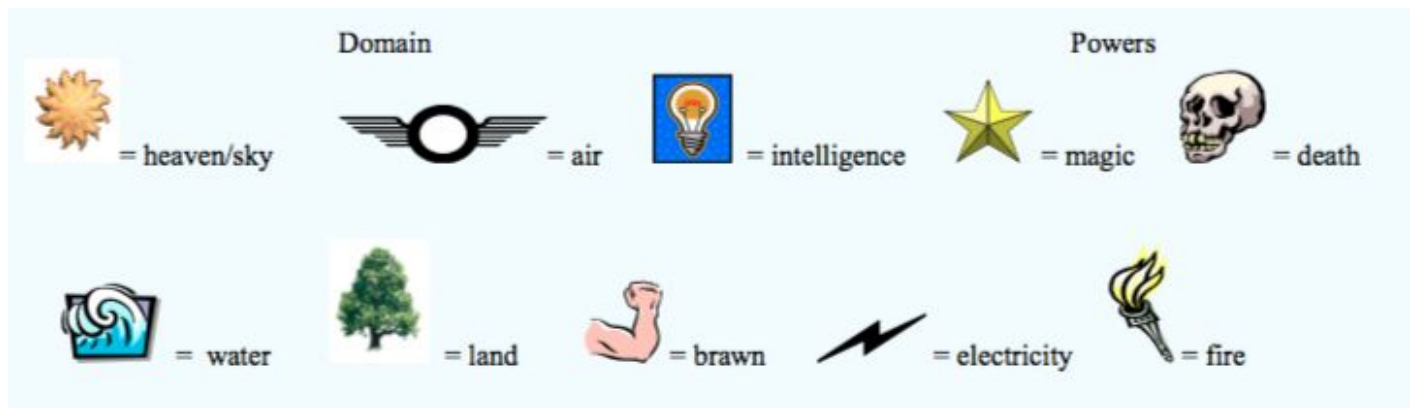
You will be responsible for researching them and writing your information in the “Research Notes” handout. As a minimum you must learn the following:

1. Who is he or she?
2. Do they have a Roman name? If so what is it?
3. What is he, she or it? I.e. god, goddess, titan?
4. Who are the relatives, allies (friends), enemies, pets, or other associates of this being?
5. Where does he, she or it live?
6. What role does he or she play in Mythology and why does this being do the things he, she or it does?
7. Is this being associated with any particular symbols or environment? I.e. earth, wind or fire?
8. Other interesting facts

B: Construct a Mythology Card

Once you have collected all the pertinent information on your character, select and organize the information by fashioning an original mythology card. The format would be similar to a Pokémon or Yu-Gi-Oh! Card; use the template provided on page 2 of this package. On one side you produce an original depiction of what the character might look like and their name. The other side will contain vital biographical information, a description of powers and special abilities. Each character needs to be categorized by the group to which they belong (god, goddess, titans, or heroes, etc.) and needs to be assigned a power rating of 1-10.

Domain icons are to be placed in the lower left hand corner of the card. Power icons are to be placed in the lower right hand corner. Each of the following icons represents specific powers or domains:

Characters are classified on a power hierarchical scale of 1 - 10, according to the following categories:

10 titans / Zeus / Hades / Poseidon
9 queen goddesses and king gods
8 veteran gods
7 new gods
6 demi-gods

5 magical creatures
4 heroes
3 human royalty
2 humans
1 wild animals

C: Presentation

Be prepared to present using only your myth card as a cue card and to answer any questions.
